

Landscaper Transition Fund Report Summary

About

The Landscaper Transition Fund was established to incentivize the transition to battery-powered lawn care equipment by providing financial assistance to the landscaping community.

As part of the "Changing the Landscape: Healthy Yards = Healthy People" Campaign, this fund spurred positive change by encouraging the adoption of sustainable landscaping practices while improving the health of the environment, landscaping workers, and community members.

The Princeton community's transition to electric landscaping equipment is creating a new standard for sustainable suburban property management that communities across the nation are working to emulate.

Outcome

Thanks to our generous donors, **\$21,000** was raised to reimburse small landscaping businesses that operate in Princeton that purchased electric landscaping equipment. After an initial low application rate, we spoke with landscaping company owners. We learned that the original \$500 maximum reimbursement per company was inadequate to cover the high costs of commercial-grade leaf blowers and batteries. Based on that feedback, this past August, we raised the reimbursement to a maximum of \$1,000. The increase in reimbursement generated a notable uptick in applications.

A Spanish and English form was provided, and businesses received funding if they met all criteria, regardless of language. About 16% of applicants used the Spanish form, indicating multilingual applications and communications importance.

The 24 landscaping businesses applied the reimbursement funds toward 93 individual pieces of battery-powered equipment, including blowers, chargers, batteries, and trimmers. The most popular brands were Greenworks, EGO, and Husqvarna.

The CAPERS (**C**limate **A**ction **P**lan **E**missions **R**eduction **S**trategies) team of researchers created a report on the economic and environmental impacts of landscaping tools. Their research estimated that the average per-crew yearly combined normal and maximum use case commercial GHG emissions and potential reductions equate to a decrease of 27.0 Tonnes of CO2e or about six vehicles taken off the road.

Since 24 unique small landscaping businesses purchased new electric equipment, we can estimate a reduction of 648 tonnes of CO₂e or about 144 passenger vehicles being removed from the road annually in Princeton alone as a result of this fund. Read the full impact report online.

Next Steps

Sustainable Princeton will check in with the grant recipients for feedback on their use of the equipment and document that it is in use after six months.

Funding recipients will be shared on Sustainable Princeton's website and associated marketing materials to publicize their steps to reduce dependence on gas-powered equipment.
