Since 2024, the annual Walk & Roll Challenge (formerly the Step Up Challenge) has encouraged residents to choose walking, biking, and other active transportation for everyday trips. The challenge highlights destinations throughout Princeton that are easy to reach without a car, promoting local businesses, parks, and community spaces while making low-carbon transportation fun, rewarding, and accessible.

Organized in partnership with the Princeton Environmental Commission and the Public Library, Green House Tours held in 2023, 2024, and 2025 showcased energy-efficient, solar-powered, and all-electric homes. Tours, expert panels, and educational videos helped residents explore practical ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, lower energy costs, and improve home comfort.



PILLAR 2: PROTECT THE LOCAL ECOSYSTEM

One property at a time.

The way we care for our yards, gardens, and landscapes has a lasting impact on local ecosystems. Sustainable Princeton helps residents, landscapers, and community partners adopt practices that restore native habitat, support pollinators, improve water quality, and reduce environmental impacts.

The Monument Park Garden transforms a prominent gateway to Princeton into a vibrant native landscape. Sustainable Princeton raised \$36,000 from generous donors to restore habitat, support pollinators, and create hands-on learning opportunities through volunteer workdays that teach the value of native plants and ecological restoration.

Developed in partnership with The Watershed Institute, these bilingual workshops, in English and Spanish, helped landscaping professionals build expertise in sustainable landscaping, green infrastructure, the use of battery-powered landscape equipment, and native plantings, positioning them to meet the growing demand for environmentally responsible landscape services.

This includes strengthening our infrastructure against flooding and extreme heat, protecting vulnerable neighbors, and managing stormwater and green spaces to keep our community healthy for generations to come.

Installed in neighborhoods that have historically experienced disproportionate environmental impacts, these native-planted downspout planters capture rooftop runoff before it reaches storm drains, helping reduce flood risk, improve water quality, and create habitat for pollinators and other wildlife.

Sustainable Princeton's Lending Library promotes sustainable living by providing free access to carefully selected tools and equipment that help residents improve home energy efficiency, create more sustainable yards and patios, and adopt environmentally friendly practices. By enabling residents to borrow items that are only needed occasionally, like party essentials, battery-powered lawncare tools, sewing machines, and so much more, the program reduces unnecessary purchases, conserves resources, saves money, and fosters a culture of sharing and reuse.

Sustainable Princeton helped secure funding and coordinate the installation of five electric vehicle (EV) charging stations – one at Spring Street Garage and four at 400 Witherspoon. This is the equivalent of preventing 1.4 railcars' worth of coal from being burned.

Since its inception in 2023, the food scraps drop-off program has reduced Princeton's carbon footprint by 42 metric tons of CO₂ — the amount sequestered by 42 acres of forest in one year.



MUNICIPAL COMMUNITY SOLAR PROGRAM
**COMING SOON FOR 1,200 LOW- AND MODERATE-
INCOME (LMI) HOUSEHOLDS**

Sustainable Princeton has partnered with the Municipality and local affordable housing providers to pave the way for a community solar program for LMI households. Once launched, families will draw electricity from a shared solar array, bringing energy bill savings to those who can't install rooftop solar themselves, whether they're renters, have too much shade, or are unable to afford installation.

2 NEW ELECTRIC SCHOOL BUSES + CHARGING INFRASTRUCTURE

Sustainable Princeton secured \$680,000 from the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection for two new electric school buses and \$100,000 from the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities for the charging infrastructure. The new electric buses provide cleaner transportation and healthier air for Princeton students.



90 TREES PLANTED ALL 6 SCHOOLS

Sustainable Princeton secured a \$92,000 Trees for Schools Grant for the district and coordinated the planting of 90 trees, enhancing campus environments, reducing the urban heat island effect, improving air quality, and supporting students' well-being.

All six Princeton public schools received sustainability grant money, supporting hands-on student learning through school gardens, native plantings, reusable serviceware, and greenhouse projects. Spring's Power Down for Popcorn competition encouraged students and staff to save energy (and money!).

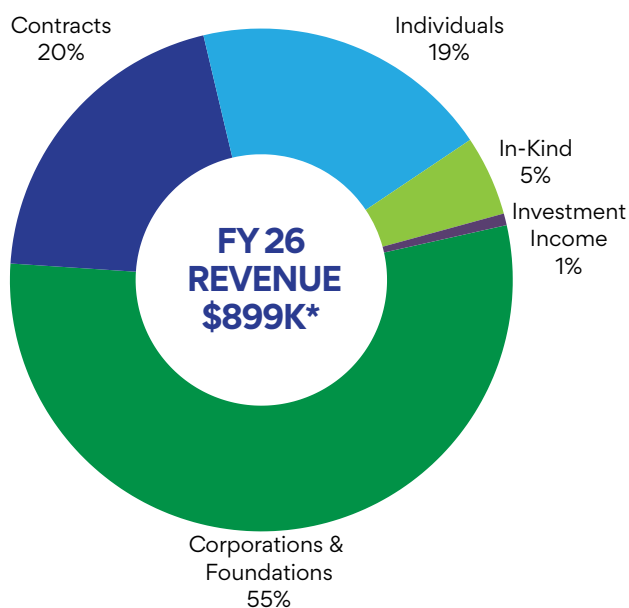
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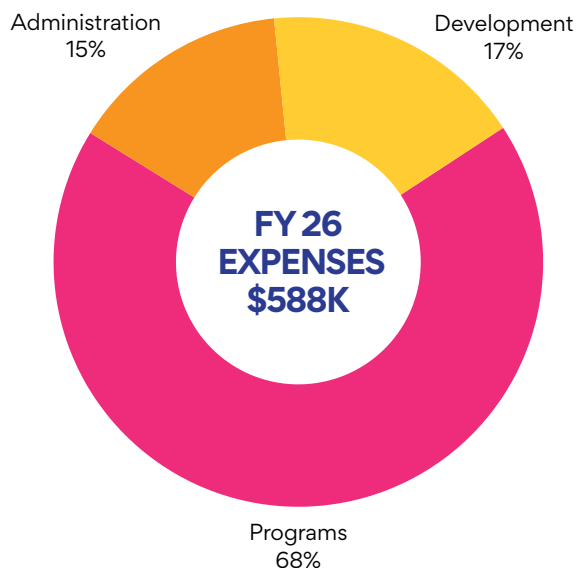
